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Introduction

Community Health Needs Assessment

Kearney Regional Medical Center (KRMC) has prepared and submitted this Community Health Needs Assessment, fulfilling the requirements established by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requiring that non-profit hospitals conduct community health needs assessments at least every three years. Several aspects of this health assessment represent a collaborative effort between Kearney Regional Medical Center, Two Rivers Health Department and CHI Good Samaritan, gathering input representing the broad interests of the community. A list of community health resources is provided.

KRMC is a full-service, 93-bed acute care hospital and affiliate of Bryan Health, a non-profit, Nebraskaowned health system. Since opening in 2014, KRMC has grown to include a medical clinic, 24-hour emergency room and Level III Trauma Center, Maternity Care Center and Level II Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

For the purposes of this report, the community served includes the city of Kearney and Buffalo County, Nebraska. Buffalo County is one of seven (7) counties served by Two Rivers Public Health Department.



Community Served by Hospital


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Community Overview

Who We Serve

For the purposes of this report, the community served by Kearney Regional Medical Center is Buffalo County, Nebraska, within which is located the city of Kearney (county seat).



Buffalo County has experienced steady and consistent growth from 1960 to 2020 (26,236 and 50,084, respectively).

From 2010 to 2020, Buffalo County's population grew from 46,102 to 50,084, an increase of 8.6 percent.

The population estimates show Buffalo County continued to increase to 50,339 in 2021.


Population & Population Growth


Age

According to Two Rivers Health Department's county health data report, Buffalo County is the "4th youngest county in Nebraska with a median age of 33.8 years.

Buffalo County is also home to the third highest number of assisted living/long term care facilities in Nebraska, after Douglas and Lancaster counties."

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2017-2021 ACS 5-Year Narrative Profile for Buffalo County, an estimated 23.5 percent of the population in Buffalo County was under 18 years, 61.7 percent were 18 to 64 years, and 14.8 percent were 65 years and older.

Population Changes by Age Group

According to Two Rivers Health Department's Community Health Needs Assessment, "between 2000 and 2010, the population increase was 2.3 percent in TRPHD, with some age groups experiencing a population decrease (5-14, 15-24, and 25-44).

Between 2010 and 2018, TRPHD experienced a population increase of 2.6 percent, with significant growth in the '65 years of age and over' population. The net growth among elderly people (65 years of age and older) is estimated at 2,603 individuals between 2010 and 2018." This trend is expected to continue over the coming years as aging individuals in the community increase and younger 'working age' individuals decrease.

Race/Ethnicity


According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2017-2021 ACS 5-Year Narrative Profile for Buffalo County, "people reporting one race alone, 89.8 percent were White; o.8 percent were Black or African American; 0.3 percent were American Indian and Alaska Native; 1.4 percent were Asian; o.o percent were Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 4.2 percent were Some other race.

An estimated 3.4 percent reported Two or more races.

An estimated 9.5 percent of the people in Buffalo County, Nebraska were Hispanic or Latino. An estimated 85.7 percent of the people in Buffalo County, Nebraska were White alone, non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race."

The total Hispanic population in the TRPHD area increased 1.6 times since 2000, growing from 8,608 individuals to 13,844 by 2018.

Estimated Percent of Hispanic/Latinos in Buffalo County (compared to other areas between 2015-2017)



Poverty Rates & SNAP

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's ACS 5-Year Narrative Profile, in Buffalo County in 2017-2021, "12.1 percent of people were in poverty. An estimated 10.5 percent of children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 10.4 percent of people 65 years old and over. An estimated 13.2 percent of people 18 to 64 years were below the poverty level.

In 2017-2021, 7.5 percent of households received SNAP (the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program). An estimated 56.1 percent of households that received SNAP had children under 18, and 25.1 percent of households that received SNAP had one or more people 60 years and over. An estimated 33.8 percent of all households receiving SNAP were families with a female householder and no spouse present. An estimated 27.2 percent of households receiving SNAP had two or more workers in the past 12 months."

Economic Indicators

Economic Characteristics

Kearney/Buffalo County has a stable and diverse economy featuring a variety of industries including manufacturing, education hospitality and healthcare.

Kearney has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation. According to the Nebraska Department of Labor, Kearney's unemployment rate in 2021 was 1.1 percent

Results of the Central Nebraska Labor Availability Survey, which included all or parts of Buffalo, Dawson, Franklin, Gosper, Harlan, Kearney, and Phelps counties, among others, revealed that there were an estimated 7,962 potential job seekers, over the age of 18, in the city of Kearney during the fall of 2016. The majority of these potential job seekers were currently employed (86%). Others were out of work or seeking to reenter the workforce after time spent in retirement or homemaking.




The median household income in Buffalo County in 2020 was \$63,513, slightly below the State of Nebraska's average of \$66,644.

Education

In 2017-2021:

The percent of persons 25 years and older in TRPHD who had obtained a high school degree or equivalency was slightly higher at 92.3% than that of Nebraska at 91.7%.

Also, a 34.5% of persons 25 years and older had obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher in Buffalo county, compared to 32.9% in Nebraska.



65.8% are overweight.

12.4% have diabetes.

11.6% have cancer.

6.8% had a heart attack/heart disease.

1.1% have had a stroke.

2020 Community Health Improvement Plan

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2020 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

Overview

Beginning in 2019, Two Rivers Public Health Department (TRPHD) embarked on a process to complete a robust community health assessment by asking community partners to participate in a Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) process in tandem with a community health needs assessment.

The MAPP process utilized a six-phase framework to gain a holistic view of the entire community's health.

- 1. Organize for Success & Partnership Development
- 2. Visioning
- 3. The Four Assessments
- 4. Identify Strategic Issues
- 5. Formulate Goals & Strategies
- 6. Action Cycle

Kearney Regional Medical Center was a participant in this six-step process.



Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats (SWOT)

To fully understand the challenges and opportunities in the health district, TRPHD conducted a discussion referred to as SWOT analysis because it includes dialogue that is related to strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats.



Goals & Objectives

The group collectively identified three goals and associated objectives for TRPHD to work on:

Access to Care

Addressing Minority Populations Objective:

 TRPHD will collaborate with local partners to create communication materials for our minority populations surrounding health behaviors and gather information to best understand the needs of the minority community within the next 60 days.

Improved Education Objective:

TRPHD will create a communication committee within the next 30 days to discuss the best system for consistent messaging (Joint Information Center-like). Ideally the collaborative group will run a targeted media campaign by January and evaluate the efficacy of the first campaign for improvement.

Increasing Vaccination Rates Objective:

TRPHD and partners will increase initial education efforts and build rapport with our community to encourage our community to appropriately use and follow approved vaccine schedules according to individual needs within the next 30 days.

Safe Environment

Safe Environment Objective

 Assess current work occurring in this area within the next 30 days to form a working group at a district level to share best practices

Mental Health and Suicide Prevention

Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Objective

TRPHD and collaborative group with partner with local behavioral health Region 2 and Region 3, especially the Nebraska Strong program, to share information immediately and improve access to mental and behavioral health resources locally. TRPHD will help both regions address the stigma associated with cost of care and perception of those accessing care.

Cardiovascular Disease

According to Two Rivers Public Health Department, Heart Disease is the leading cause of death in Buffalo County.

Annually, 79/100,000 people in Buffalo County die from cardiovascular disease.


Of the top ten chronic conditions treated at Kearney Regional Medical Center/Platte Valley Medical Clinic from January 1, 2017 to June 30, 2022, four were related to cardiovascular conditions:

Hypertension: 81,898 visits Ischemic heart disease: 40,035

Heart failure: 28,537

Atrial fibrillation: 15, 343 visits

Trend lines for hypertension, ischemic heart disease and heart failure have each remained steady or increased over the past five years due to increased market demand.


The addition of an electrophysiology program at KRMC in 2020 has impacted the trend line for atrial fibrillation visits during this five-year period.




Ischemic heart disease Visits: 40,035

Access to Care

According to the TRPHD 2020 Community Health Needs Assessment, Two Rivers Health Department identified at least five counties with a reported shortage of care professionals in the following areas:

- Family Practice
- · Psychiatry and Mental Health
- General Internal Medicine
- General Surgery
- Primary Care

Hospitals are a core service provider in any community. They are the source of patients for services such as pharmacy and outpatient therapies (PT, OT, Speech). When access to care is impacted by a lack of providers it has a ripple effect in to the community going so far as the local grocery store. The Nebraska Rural Health Association wrote that "When a hospital closes, you see that the community struggles. Pharmacies close, grocery stores close, companies choose not to locate to a place where their employees won't have access to a hospital. More is at stake, it seems, than convenient access to the services hospitals provide. The economic impact of the hospital." Increasing access to care through recruitment of providers is meaningful to more than just patients but to every corner of the community, all the way down to healthy food access at the local grocery store.

In 2021 an economic impact study was completed for KRMC to demonstrate the importance of having access to care in Kearny and the surrounding areas. The study further supports the findings of the Nebraska Rural Health Association, showing that access to care – and increasing access to cares supports the entire community and their health both directly and indirectly.

Nursing Shortages

As a national level the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services predicts there will be a need for 3.6 million RN's by the year 2030. This trickles down to impact individuals in every community across the nation. According to the Nebraska Center for Nursing, Nebraska will experience a workforce shortage of 5,435 nurses by 2025. In December of 2022 there were 36 open nursing positions at KRMC. Each of these roles is critical to providing high quality, safe patient care and insuring access to all who seek care. In 73 of Nebraska's 93 counties there is less than the national average ratio of patients to nurses. 66 Nebraska counties are considered medically underserved from a nursing perspective.

The lack of nurses in Buffalo county impacts not only the physical and mental health of the community but also the economic health. This ties in with KRMC's priority for increasing access to care because hospitals are economic drivers in their communities. They allow cities to attract and retain talent and employ their nonhealthcare family members.

Nursing shortages impact patient outcomes in a variety of ways. Studies show that nursing shortages lead to lower patient satisfaction, a decrease in the quality of care provided, increase in medical errors in new graduates who may not have senior staff to mentor them, and an increase in patient mortality.
